Purpose of the Plan

• The purpose of this plan is to show how St. Anne Line Catholic Junior School intends, over time, to increase the accessibility of our school for disabled pupils.

Definition of Disability

 A person has a disability if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on his or her ability to carry out normal day to day activities.

Legal Background

- From September 2002, the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 outlawed discrimination by schools and LA's against either current or prospective disabled pupils in their access to education. It is a requirement that the school's accessibility plan is resourced, implemented and reviewed and revised as necessary. These provisions are now contained in the Equality Act 2010.
- This plan sets out the proposals of the Governing Body of the school to increase access to education for disabled pupils in the three areas required by the planning duties in the DDA:
 - Increasing the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the school curriculum, which includes teaching and learning and the wider curriculum of the school, such as participation in after school clubs, leisure and cultural activities or school visits;
 - Improving the environment of the school to increase the extent to which disabled pupils can take advantage of education and associated services, which includes improvements to the physical environment of the school and physical aids to access education.

- Improving the delivery to disabled pupils of information e.g. Hand-outs, timetables, textbooks and information about school events. The information should take account of the pupils` disabilities and the preferred format of pupils and parents and be made available within a reasonable timeframe.
- St. Anne Line Catholic Junior School aims to treat all stakeholders, including pupils, prospective pupils, staff, governors and other members of the school community favourably and, wherever possible, takes reasonable steps to avoid placing anyone at a disadvantage. In addition, the school aims to work closely with disabled pupils, their families and any relevant outside agencies, in order to remove or minimise any potential barriers to learning, which puts them at a disadvantage, but allows them to learn, achieve and participate fully in school life. The school is active in promoting positive attitudes to disabled people in the school and in planning to increase access to education for all disabled pupils.
- As part of the school's continued communication with parents, carers and other stakeholders we continually look at ways to improve accessibility through data collection, questionnaires and parental discussions.

Contextual Information

Most of the school building and playground is accessible for a child, or visitor in a wheelchair. Any area which is not directly accessible can be accessed via an alternative route.

The Current Range of Disabilities within St. Anne Line Catholic Junior School

- The school has children with a limited range of disabilities which include Autistic Spectrum Disorder, cerebral palsy and serious medical conditions with related susceptibility to infections. When children enter school with specific disabilities, the school contacts the LA professionals for assessments, support and guidance for the school and parents.
- We have a few children who have asthma and all staff are aware of these children.
 Inhalers are kept in school and a record of use is noted. The school also has an emergency inhaler.
- Some children have allergies or food intolerances/cultural food choices. Epi-pens are kept in school and a record of use is noted. Key staff receive training.
- All medical information is collated and available to staff, on the staff noticeboard and in all classrooms.
- All children taking medication, or with a recognised disability have a frequently reviewed Care Plan.
- We have competent First Aiders who hold current First Aid certificates. There is always a first aider in attendance on the playground at playtime and lunchtime.
- All medication is kept in a central safe and secure place which has easy access for First
 Aiders and staff members. Administration of Medicines consent forms are filled in by
 parents outlining the illness and amount and time of medication. All medication that is
 given is recorded.
